Dear Unit Leader

Thank you for the important leadership you provide to the youth of the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council, Boy Scouts of America. Your efforts have a positive impact on the youth of our community and your support is greatly appreciated.

What is Friends of Scouting (FOS)?

Friends of Scouting is the Council's annual fundraising campaign that helps support quality programs for youth throughout the council service area. We rely upon philanthropic support, earned revenue, and our Friends of Scouting Campaign to provide year-round activities and programs for our youth. In addition, we operate several summer camp opportunities, provide support for professional and volunteer training, maintain registration records, and produce program materials to support all these activities. On average it costs \$350 to provide these crucial local support services for just one Scout for one year of program.

How can you help?

Our goal is to have 100% participation from all our units and families.

We are asking for your help by scheduling a presentation in this year's Friends of Scouting Campaign and appointing an FOS Unit Coordinator. We need this support to ensure these vital components of the Scouting experience are possible. We have established an attainable council-wide goal of \$1,000,000 from all districts to support the numerous programs of the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council. These programs exist to give our youth the opportunity to grow as leaders, citizens, and themselves.

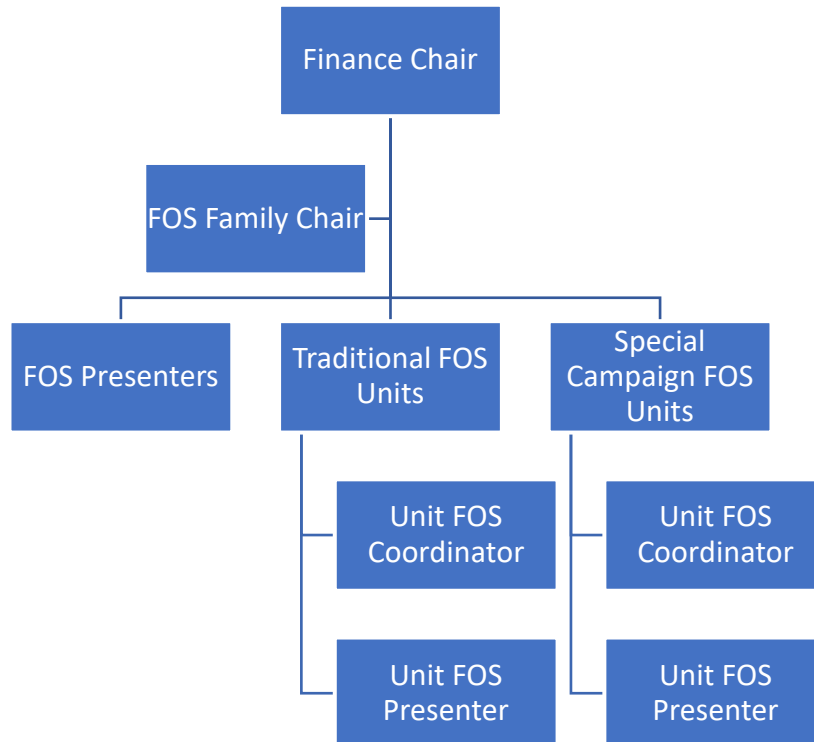
The presentation will be conducted by a volunteer member of your unit or district Friends of Scouting team. This presenter is a volunteer who inspires leaders, parents, and relatives of your Scouts to invest in the Scouting program. This presenter will share a personal story about Scouting and ask those in attendance to consider an investment of \$350 to support the programs in which your Scouts could participate in.





Friends of Scouting Team

Your role at the unit level is very important, but you should know that you are not alone in this effort. You form part of a bigger team that is there to support and help you achieve your unit FOS goal.



If you ever have any questions or need assistance, there are plenty of people to help, all you need to do is reach out to your District Executive to get in touch with any of the volunteers that compose your district FOS Team.





How your Unit Can Support Friends of Scouting (FOS)

Unit Presentation

Your Unit FOS Coordinator will be contacted by the District FOS Family Chair or District Executive to establish the FOS goal for the unit and coordinate an FOS presentation date. During the FOS presentation, the FOS Presenter will explain the campaign and goals of the unit to all the families in attendance. Families and Unit Leaders will be asked to make a tax-deductible contribution to support the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council.

We invite you to take an active role in this endeavor. The results of this support will benefit all Scouts, their families, our communities, and provide a tremendous feeling of accomplishment.

Your District Executive is always accessible to assist your unit with the Friends of Scouting (FOS) plan. By reviewing this guide, you will take the first step to help make the Scouting program sustainable for your unit and the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council.

Types of FOS Campaigns

Traditional FOS Campaign

During a traditional FOS campaign, your unit leader or FOS Unit Coordinator will invite a district volunteer guest to come to your Blue & Gold or Court of Honor and make a 5-10-minute FOS ask to all the families in attendance. The presenter will talk about Friends of Scouting, where the money goes, and how people can make a gift. At the end of the event, your FOS Presenter will share with the group how much money was raised and will then connect with the FOS Unit Coordinator to ensure that the Unit Coordinator will personally follow up with every family not in attendance.

Unit-Led FOS Campaign

The Unit-Led FOS Campaign is similar to the Traditional FOS Campaign, except that in this case the FOS Unit Coordinator is responsible for making the FOS ask to the unit or securing an FOS Presenter from within the unit. As a best practice, the FOS presenter should be an adult who is knowledgeable about Friends of Scouting and someone who can efficiently and eloquently communicate all aspects of FOS and has attended the FOS Presenter training. For more information about this training, please contact your District Executive.





E-mail FOS Campaign

Another type of FOS campaign is the e-mail campaign. Your FOS Unit Coordinator will draft an e-mail endorsed by the unit leader, which explains the FOS campaign; it includes the unit’s goal and URL, QR code, and text to give information and will send it to all the families in the unit. In order for this type of campaign to be successful, your FOS Unit Coordinator will need to follow up with all families in the unit. We have plenty of resources to help the FOS Unit Coordinator be successful, including template e-mails at the end of this guide.

Friends of Scouting Campaign Timeline

FOS Unit Coordinator Checklist

Here is a checklist of action items to ensure your success as your unit's FOS Coordinator.

- Designate your unit FOS Coordinator
- Designate your unit FOS Presenter
- FOS Unit Coordinator contacts District FOS Family Chair and District Executive before December 30th to communicate:
 - FOS Coordinator name and contact information
 - FOS presenter name and contact information. *(If you would like your District FOS Family Chair to facilitate an FOS Presenter, you can communicate it at this time).*
 - FOS Presentation
 - Date
 - Time
 - Location (or Zoom link)
- Obtain your Unit FOS Goal from your District Executive before December 30th. *(All FOS unit goals are designed to be achievable. If you have any questions about your unit goal, contact your District Executive to ask how it was produced).*
- Introduce yourself as the FOS Unit Coordinator to all of the families in your unit by sending the Family FOS Letter of Introduction found at the end of this guide. Your unit leader and District Executive can provide you a roster with contact information for the families in your unit. *(Share your unit goal, include text-to-give and URL link to give information, and highlight the importance of Friends of Scouting).*
- 1-week before the date of your FOS presentation. Send a reminder to all the families in your unit about the upcoming FOS Presentation.
- The night of your FOS presentation. Send a Thank You! note to all of the families for their contributions and communicate how much money was raised. Remind them about the ways to make their gift go further (corporate matching, Dollars for Doers, Amazon Smile, etc.).
- 1-week after the date of your FOS presentation. Follow up with the families that were absent the night of the FOS presentation; remember that every family deserves the opportunity to contribute to Friends of Scouting.
- 1-month after the date of your FOS presentation. Send an e-mail update with the total amount of money raised, thank those that have contributed and encourage folks to donate if they have not done it yet. Don't forget to include the text-to-give and URL to give information and highlight the importance of Friends of Scouting.





- Continue to share e-mail updates with all the families in your unit on a monthly basis through April 30th. This report should include the total amount of money raised and the text-to-give and URL to give information.
- During the month of May. Make personal phone calls to all of the families in your unit that have yet to make a gift to Friends of Scouting; remember that one of the goals is 100% participation and that every family deserves the opportunity to contribute to Friends of Scouting.
- Provide any constructive feedback to your District Executive.
- Work with your unit leader to identify the FOS Unit Coordinator for next year. It may be a good idea to identify this individual and have them work with you as your understudy to learn and understand the unit Friends of Scouting campaign.

Best practices for success:

- Constant communication with your District FOS Family Chair and District Executive are key to a successful FOS unit campaign. You should be communicating with your District FOS Family Chair at least once every two-weeks during the months of December - June to discuss the progress of your unit campaign.
- Encourage families to give at a level they are comfortable.
- If at any point you would like an update on your unit contributions, your District Executive can share with you a detailed FOS report.
- The best way to follow up is to make personal contact. If e-mails are not getting you the engagement you hoped for, pick up the phone and call people.
- There are lots of resources and volunteer support available to you, do not be afraid to ask for help if you need it.





How to Give to Friends of Scouting

Text to Give

Donors have the option of making a gift to Friends of Scouting through their smartphone. It is a quick, easy, and convenient way to support Scouting! Simply text the number listed on the pledge form (or provided by your District Executive), enter your unit keyword, and be directed to a mobile friendly version of your unit fundraising page.

Ways to Make Your Gift Go Further

Looking for a way to make a difference by supporting Scouting? Participate in your company's *Corporate Matching* and *Dollars for Doers* employee giving programs! Many companies in Silicon Valley Monterey Bay have adopted a culture of giving-back by integrating corporate social responsibility into their mission and encouraging their employees to make a difference in their communities. They are accomplishing that in a couple of ways.

Have you submitted your Corporate Match or participated in the Dollars for Doers program, yet? Just in 2023, the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council benefited from a total of over \$154,000 in matching gifts, all thanks to your support. Please consider doubling your impact to the Friends of Scouting this year and help us raise the necessary funds to bring the Scouting program to more youth.

Corporate Matching

Corporate matching provides the opportunity for employees to make a charitable donation to a 501c3 non-profit, which is then matched through allocated funds by their employer; in some cases, matching each donation 1:1, sometimes even at a ratio of 2:1. These are great opportunities for Scouters to make their contributions go further by doubling, and in some cases even tripling, their level of generosity.

Dollars for Doers

The Dollars for Doers program is a contribution program that donates cash grants to approved 501c3 non-profits, based on the time that the employee volunteers with that particular organization. There are two major benefits to this program, it allows employees to donate their time with an organization that resonates with their values and interests; while at the same time, allowing the company to magnify those efforts by donating funds to such organization for each hour their employee volunteers.

How Scouting is Funded

Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council is Funded Through:

- Friends of Scouting donations
- Special events – Golf and Clays Events
- Executive Board support
- Product sales (popcorn)
- Activity fees, camporees, etc.

- Endowment Income
- Summer camp fees*

*Camping and activity revenue does not cover cost to maintain our facilities. The council invests significant income each year to provide safe and well-maintained properties and offices.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q1. Doesn't the \$96 Annual Registration fee cover the needs of the Council?

A. The \$80 of the annual registration fee goes entirely to the national office. The remaining \$16 is used to defray some of the insurance costs of Scouting.

Q2. How are Friends of Scouting funds used?

A. Friends of Scouting represents approximately 19% of annual operating budget. These funds are used to provide year-round activities and programs, support and operate camp facilities, provide opportunities for professional and volunteer training, maintain registration records, and produce program materials to support these activities. On average it costs \$350 to provide these crucial local support services for just one Scout for one year of program.

Q3. What about families in need? An additional gift is a lot to ask.

A. We know that families cannot all give at the same level. We ask each family to consider giving at whatever level feels most comfortable, even if they choose not to participate.

Q4. I support the council with my time, do I have to give my money?

- A. Thank you for everything you do to help provide an outstanding program. Where do you work? Many companies will donate for every hour that you volunteer or contribute a matching gift for your donation. (Dollars for Doers)
- B. If giving to Scouting would be too much for your family budget, will you ask friends, family, or Scouting Alumni to consider a gift to Scouting? Anyone can be Friends of Scouting contributor. The Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council can provide units with their own personalized web page and text to give option that should be shared with friends and family anywhere to help achieve the unit goal.

Q5. Why should I contribute to the Friends of Scouting Campaign? I didn't last year, and all the camps and events still took place.

A. The Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council needs your support to ensure Scouting is available to all youth who can benefit from the values taught. Scouting extends beyond your local den or patrol. The values of Scouting travel far beyond your pack, troop, or crew. Scouting will continue to be strong with the support of volunteers and families like yours.

Position Description

Vision:

Provide leadership for your unit's 2024 Friends of Scouting campaign. The Unit FOS Coordinator's efforts will help organize the unit's FOS Campaign by communicating with the families in their unit and providing them with the resources necessary for their success; including providing FOS information and literature to prepare families for their unit FOS presentation.

Reports to: District Family Friends of Scouting Chair

Responsibilities:

- Schedule a Family FOS Presentation Date for the unit with the District Family FOS Chairman or District Executive.
- Coordinate the Family FOS Campaign for the unit with the Unit FOS Presenter.
- Working with the Unit FOS Presenter, review each family card prior to the presentation to check for accuracy, to evaluate the ask amount, and to determine how many extra brochures will be needed.
- Communicate and promote the unit family presentation date and purpose to the leaders and family members of the unit.
- Introduce the Unit FOS Presenter the night of the presentation and encourage family support with the Family FOS Campaign.
- Follow up with every family in your unit after the presentation to secure contributions from families not in attendance.
- Turn contributions in to District Executive within two days of the presentation.
- Return Presenter Kit within two days of the presentation back to the Council office or to District Executive.
